21.4.3 Checking Conditional Text Settings

If conditional text is not hidden or shown as specified in XHTML output, it is probably due to improper conditional text settings. Ensure that conditional text is applied properly, to entire elements:


- 1. In Structure View, select the element that should be conditionalized.
- **2.** From the **Special** menu, choose **Conditional Text**.
- **3.** In the Conditional Text dialog box, look for the following settings:
 - **Current Selection Is:** Conditional
 - **In**: one type of conditional text
 - **Not In**: all other types of conditional text
 - As Is: blank

These are the appropriate settings for conditional text. However, if more than one type of conditional text is listed in the In column, or the item is marked as conditional, but all of the conditional text setting names are in the As Is column as shown in Figure 21–4, you must fix the settings, as explained in Section 21.4.

21.4.4 Removing Conditional Text Settings

Deleting a conditional element does not remove the conditional text setting there. For example, if you delete a Comment element that is conditionalized with the Comment conditional text format, you can delete the Comment element, but the Comment conditional text format remains. If you insert a Para element in the same place, it will appear as Comment conditionalized text.

To remove a condition from text, that is, to make text unconditional, follow these steps:

- Select the element that is currently conditionalized.
- From the **Special** menu, choose **Conditional Text**.
- In the Conditional Text dialog box, select **Unconditional**. 3.
- Click **Apply**.
- Close the Conditional Text dialog box.

Tip: You can also remove a conditional text setting by selecting the element and pressing Ctrl+6.

21.4.5 Showing and Hiding Content in Oracle Help

You can use FrameMaker conditional text to include or exclude specific content from online Help. For example, you may want to omit certain information (such as a list of included topics at the start of each section) from the online Help.

- Create a new FrameMaker condition; for example, OnlineHelp.
- Apply the condition to the appropriate paragraphs in the FrameMaker 7.0 file.
